Prez Says July 2015

This month, I have decided to talk about how The Basin Street Regulars is drawing itself into the electronic age. This hasn't been easy, but we know that we need to embrace Social Media if we want to keep up with the times and other jazz clubs across the country.

About 10 years ago, BSR's only entry on the internet was our website, which had been created by one of our founders, K.O. Ecklund, and sported all the quirkiness and humor that permeates everything he did, complete with Creole recipes and a dissertation on the history of BSR. The site was created in the 80s and the only changing information on it was the dates and bands for the event calendar and the dates for Jubilee. Updates were provided faithfully to the webmaster by Jerry Koory.

We got together with our webmaster at the time, and rewrote the text and added links to other websites, such as the jazz camps, as well as membership forms, volunteer forms, etc. We preserved "Our Illustrious History", which can be found as a link of the home page of pismojazz.com. That was written by K.O. Ecklund, and gives you a glimpse into his style. This is the same man who drew all of the original artwork for "Jazzper".

A few years after the new website was launched, one of the High School jammers, Joseph Simonian, approached us about starting a Facebook page for BSR. Facebook was fairly new at the time, and none of us were quite ready for it. Plus, we knew from our experience with the website that social media of any kind must be maintained and that once Joseph went off to college, we would not have anyone to monitor or post on it. The Board discussed it and we regretfully turned him down.

Fast forward to last year. Linda Shorb came on the scene, fresh from her experience of running a small business. She knew that we needed to be on Social Media to get the word out and spread our message in today's electronic world. She started a Facebook page and ran like gangbusters. We now have three Facebook pages, a personal page, "Rhonda BSR Cardinal", a fan page, "Basin Street Regulars" and another fan page, "Jubilee by the Sea". We took some social media marketing classes together and they told us that we should only use fan pages (business pages), not personal pages to promote an organization. However, we have found that it is much easier to get the word out from a personal page, so we continue to use it.

We started sending out the newsletter electronically to those that have e-mail addresses and agree to receive their newsletters that way. Many people now prefer not to have paper cluttering up their house and it saves us a lot on mailing costs. Plus we can include a lot more pictures and full color flyers on the electronic version, which would be prohibitively expensive on hardcopy mailings. Linda Shorb has been taking our regular newsletter, beautifully prepared by Chris Wilbert, expanding it and sending it out as an e-newsletter.

Another site we have had for many years is our YouTube site: https://www.youtube.com/user/BasinStreetRegulars

This is where all of the videos that Jeff makes from the back of the room eventually go. It takes awhile to get them ready to post. They have to be edited and named and uploaded and I am usually several months behind, but we eventually get them done. There is a link to the YouTube site from the home page of our website, pismojazz.com. It is a big button that says "YouTube". I also make DVDs for the bands to give to them of their entire performance. DVDs of past events are available if anyone has a favorite that they want.

Jim Borland is now running the website as our webmaster, which gives us a lot more flexibility as to what we can put on our site. We have a Paypal "Donate Now" button, which we think will help us generate much needed funds to run our club. This was added with the help of John Shorb.

The last bastion of Social Media for us will be a blog. New member, Dean Krikorian, has started this effort. A blog is a combination of a website and a newsletter. In the future, each will be reflective of the other. In fact, all of our Social Media and print media should be consistent and carry the same message. That is what we learned in our class. Don't worry, though, we are not giving up on our regular newsletter.

For the moment, we should thank everyone who has put in the effort to bring us into the 21st century, Linda Shorb, John Shorb, Jim Borland, Dean Krikorian and Jeff Cardinal. We hope they will continue to support us for many years to come


Steven Saavedra - Sacramento Youth Camp

"Creole Syncopators" Intermission Band in July:

The Creole Syncopators, one of the West Coast's leading (authentic) Traditional Jazz bands play hot jazz and blues from the 1920's. They include some of the spirited music from Chicago's South Side, as well as early New Orleans. They specialize in great (undeservedly) obscure tunes originally performed by artists such as Johnny Dobbs, Junie Cobb, Punch Miller, Ma Rainey, Bessie Smith and the State Street Ramblers.

Featured with the band is Valerie Johnson, one of today's great world-class blues and jazz singers. Ms Johnson, who also performs with Big Brother and the Holding Company and has been chosen to be the lead singer in the All Star California Sunshine Band, is undoubtedly one of the most authentic and powerful blues singers on today's traditional jazz scene. When she performs with the Syncopators, the result is jazz that sounds as alive and fresh as it did during the Prohibition era.

The Creole Syncopators, who have 3 CD's to their credit, led by reedman Jeff Beaumont, hail from California's Central Coast. At the 2001 Morro Bay Jazz Festival they were voted "Best Jazz Band". In 1999 they toured Japan and garnered rave reviews. In addition to leader Jeff Beaumont, the band's personnel consists of Dave Caparone, trombone; Marc Caparone, cornet; Elita Chaffin, bass (not this Sunday); Al Ingram, banjo; Shirley Beaumont, washboard; and, of course, the phenomenal Valerie Johnson, vocals.
