Prez Says June 2015

This month, I went to a festival that was very different from our "Jubilee by the Sea". It was called the "World Ukulele Congress" and it was held in a field outside of Needmore, Indiana. My sister-in-law has been going there for the last five years and loved it so much that she wanted to share it. So she invited all of her sisters, daughters and sister-in-laws to join her, and almost all of us took her up on the invitation.

To get to anywhere from the Central Coast is a project, so I split my flight into two days, stopping in Phoenix overnight to visit an old friend that I used to work with. The next day I flew non-stop to Indianapolis. At the airport, I met up with another of Jeff's sisters, Jenny and a niece, Wendy, and we all shared a very small rental car to take us to "the field of dreams".

Ukulele World Congress is held on a big grassy field surrounded by towering trees. A stream runs along one side. The drive to the field takes you through the back woods, which seem uninhabited, except that houses and small businesses pepper the roads. The lawns are impossibly large and green, without the benefit of sprinklers. The greenery is so lush that many of the street signs are obscured, making navigation difficult. On our first go-round, we made many incorrect turns. Although we did not arrive until 8:30 p.m., it was still very light out. Our reputations preceded us and we were introduced like visiting royalty. Jeff's sisters Patti and Sally had already been there for a few days, along with Sally's other two daughters, Katie and Penny. Having "7 Cardinals at Ukulele World Congress" was a major event. But we were apprehensive about the drive to our hotel on more dark and unfamiliar roads, so after a quick dinner, we hotelers left for the evening.

The next day we arrived back at around 2:00 p.m. ready to experience the full festival. It was not and humid during the days, but the trees and the stream offered relief. There was also a large wooden permanent stage on the field which was a great place to sit and play during the day. I sat in with a few groups, attempting to play my four ukulele chords.

At 4:20, Sally signed up for her slot in the "Open Mic" portion of the festival. This is an open mic like no other. There are 100 slots, 2 songs each. About 70 people signed up. A professional sound company had been hired to set up the equipment and monitor the sound during the performances.

Around 5:00, the entertainment began. No guitars or drums are allowed. Musical selections were wide ranging. On Friday night, I heard original songs (usually very funny), rock songs ("Walk Like an Egyptian" was my favorite), folk songs, ballads, heavy metal, jazz- all accompanied by ukuleles. Sally played two original tunes, one of which was about a crawdad that had crawled into her tent several years ago. By 10:00 at night, about 40 people had played. A pot-luck dinner was held, the food kept arriving. The crowd swelled as people drove in for the evening. The emcees traded off announcing the performers, each emcee hosted for about an hour.

A huge bonfire illuminated the center of the field, radiating heat in all directions, as the air temperature slowly cooled down. Full darkness did not arrive until 10:00 p.m. Against the background of the trees that ringed the field, fireflies appeared. I had not seen them since I was a kid in Massachusetts in 1966.

On Saturday night, the Cardinal Sisters were scheduled to perform a song during open mic, so we spent a good part of that afternoon practicing. Our song was "Memories are Made of This". Sally and Jenny played the ukes and sang lead, Patti and I were the back-up singers. We found a shady glen near the trees and hung out practicing until it was time for our performance. We were on early in the show, number 13. Soon we were done and could enjoy the rest of the evening. A BBQ was lit, the crew continuously provided sausages for all takers. More potluck dishes were put out. Again the crowd swelled and a smaller bonfire was lit.

A special treat was Sally's special parasol parade. Inspired by the Dixieland second line tradition, she had spent the year purchasing umbrellas from thrift stores and then found little battery-powered light kits at the 99 cent store. A few zip ties later and "viola", lighted parasols. She handed these out to a previously selected list of friends. Other friends had brought theirs from previous years. As it got dark the new umbrellas were handed out and the old ones appeared. We massed on the field and waited for the best song. At some point, Sally decided that the time was right- a slow song sung by the "Flea Bitten Dawgs" (they're great, look them up), and off we went, whirling and twirling our umbrellas as we strolled across the field. The effect was magical and beautiful. Videos of this parade do it justice.

It was a memorable trip and a chance for some family bonding that we might otherwise not have had.

I would definitely make it again.

Night Blooming Jazzmen in June

Perennial favorites "The Night Blooming Jazzmen" will be our feature band in June. The Night Blooming Jazzmen (NBJ, or "Nightbloomers") is a traditional, or dixieland band, formed in October 1975 to represent the Society for the Preservation of Dixieland Jazz at the third Sacramento Jubilee. There were very few jazz bands in existence then – not enough to put on a festival. The NBJ was started as an ad-hoc "pick-up band." It was not expected to survive – but the NBJ were so well-received and had so much fun that they stuck together. Since then, they have played thousands of concerts, church services, funerals, house parties, grand openings, jazz clubs, wedding receptions, dances, etc.. AND several dozen cruises and land trips to China, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, Alaska, Hawaii, the Caribbean, the Panama Canal, the Amazon, the Mediterranean, and many other parts of Europe.

The Night Blooming Jazzmen is one of the busiest bands in the nation. They have a lot of fun with their audiences and each other and despite this their music is top-quality. They play well *and* put on a great show. The band's Sunday morning "hymn-a-long" often has the largest attendance of any event at a festival. They have played at our own "Jubilee by the Sea" almost every year since the inception of our festival. To quote from a recent festival program:

"The Nightbloomers are certainly the most popular band right here in the greater Los Angeles area despite some awesome competition. Not only does leader Chet Jaeger put on a fine line of patter, but practically the whole band sings. The band is in constant demand. Despite that, the band finds plenty of time to play locally and very graciously for charities and jazz club dates. One specialty of the band is spirituals and hymns. Despite the old jokes, spontaneous nuttiness and musical spoofs,

the band puts out jazz of very high quality. No hour or so is better spent than enjoying the Nightbloomers."
