Special Sets and Feature Sets

Special Sets are put together by prior Festival Director George Smith, bringing top musicians from different groups together to create and unscripted and memorable event. The Special Sets as currently envisioned will be comprised of the following musicians from the listed bands:

- **3-Guitars:** Larry Scala and Bill Bosch (Larry, Dawn and Friends), Jim Lawlor and Pat Mercury (Midiri Brothers), and John Merril (Cunningham).
- 3 Clarinets: Bob Draga, Joe Midiri, Paul Midiri, and Steve Pikal (Midiri Brothers), Larry Scala (Larry, Dawn and Friends), Adrian Cunningham (Professor Cunningham and His Old School).

George's All-Stars: Bob Schulz, Adrian Cunningham (Professor Cunningham and His Old School), Larry Scala (Larry, Dawn and Friends), Danny Coots, Steve Pikal (Midiri Brothers), Haruka Kikuchi (The Shake Em Up Jazz Band), Jason Wanner (Blue Street).

Feature Sets are proposed by the bands to highlight styles or musicians that they connect strongly with. Bands proposing Feature Sets sent in descriptions of their Feature Sets. Here are the responses we have received to date:

Creole Syncopators- Gospel, Women of the Blues, New Orleans

- 1) **Gospel set**; For 35 years the Syncopators have always done a Sunday morning Gospel set, playing Old Time Hymns that were taught by the original New Orleans Jazzmen, around the Big Easy on Friday & Saturday nights during the 1920's, and then at their respective churches on Sunday Mornings.
- 2) Women of the Blues set: Valerie's specialty is singing the greatest selections of Bessie Smith and her mentor Gertrude "Ma" Rainey in their authentic style, as well as some of the lesser known Blues artists of the Roaring 20's.
- 3) **New Orleans set**; The Early Jazzmen of the Crescent City were a major influence on the band, especially leader Jeff Beaumont, who learned to play in the style from some of the original musicians who played with Johnny Dodds, Kid Ory, King Oliver, Jelly Roll Morton, even Buddy Bolden and Sam Morgan.

Paul Ingle- Australian Tunes

Australia, among other countries worldwide, was introduced to jazz following the musical sensation created in New York in 1917-18 by the Original Dixieland Jazz Band. News of this new music quickly reached Australia via the entertainment press and the vaudeville artists appearing on the popular theatre circuits. Jazz bands were formed in response to the new craze and, with a social dancing boom quickly became an Australian post-war phenomenon. Although Australia had embraced the Jazz Age, limited manuscripts of the American jazz tunes were available, so many bush and outback tunes were updated in the new style.

The Australian Jazz Connection will introduce these early tunes along with songs from the Second World War, often about romance between the USA soldiers and innocent Australian girls. Their selections will include familiar numbers, including the popular "Waltzing Matilda."

Sue Palmer- Mardi Gras, Swing, Boogie Woogie **Mardi Gras:** San Diego is home to the Gator by the Bay Festival, in which the band has been a fixture for over 10 years, featuring a solid set of Carnival material!

Swing: The Motel Swing Orchestra will play swing favorites of Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Gershwin, and many others. **Boogie Woogie:** Sue Palmer, the Queen of Boogie Woogie, has performed all over the world, often with the best-known specialists including Sonny Leyland, Hadda Brooks, and Marcia Ball. The band backs her up with enthusiasm!!

The Professor- Darin, Count Basie Tributes Bobby Darin- a countdown of his greatest hits.

The Professor and His Old School will climb through Bobby Darin's Billboard chart toppers, from #100 all the way to #1! **Count Basie Tribute**- no band could swing harder than Basie's. Come celebrate some of Swing's greatest anthems.

Jam-Balaya: July Jam Review: JUST SWING IT!

We were again a bit understaffed at this month's jams, especially on Set 1, but we made it work featuring a lot of new tunes and some BSR standards.

The first set was titled *Richard-less Oldies*, because Richard wasn't directing, but we maintained his *real oldies* spirit (*composition date*). **Set 1 Tunes:** (1) *Dr. Jazz* (1926); (2) *Muskrat Rumble* (1926); (3) *Indiana* (1917) with Sandy Smallwood on vocals; (4) *Route 66* (1946) with Jeff Cardinal on vocals; (5) *Do You Know What It Means to Be Miss New Orleans?* (1947), Sandy singing again; (6) *Bye Bye Blackbird* (1926), *with* Rhonda Cardinal on vocals.

Set 1 Musicians: George Smith & Jeff on Trumpet, I played Tenor Sax, Rhonda sang & played Alto Sax, Ed Rush joined in on Bari Sax on the last tune, Bill Portune on Plectrum Banjo (Portune on Plectrum, has a nice ring to it), Fearless Frank Coop on guitar, Joel Siegel on bass, Del Gomes on piano, John Nye on drums, & Kris "Wash" Baird stepping up as lead washboard. Fernie Monreal ran sound. Solo Kudos: Given our understaffing on this set, the plan here was to let Del Gomes run the show on piano. He started on right on time & kept the show going: When in doubt: Del. Kris had a nice washboard solo that got the crowd going: She can handle the section, Wash being her middle name. Jeff did a swell job on Route 66, perhaps his signature tune: Given the recent road trip, it seemed fitting.

I directed the second set, which included three new tunes (1,2, & 4): They went well, better than expected. You never know which tunes work until you play them! **Set 2 Tunes:** (1) *Hello, Dolly* (1964), and Barbara handled vocals; (2) *I Want to Be Happy* (1925); (3) *Mairzy Doats* (1943), featured Ed & Sandy on vocals; (4) *Buddy Bolden Blues* (1938), with Rhonda on vocals; & (5) *Rosetta* (1936), and Jeff sang it.

Set 2 Musicians: George & Jeff on trumpet, I played Tenor Sax, Rhonda on Alto Sax, Ed on Bari Sax, Del on clarinet, Ken Heiges on drums, Dee Trent & Gary Ryan on banjo, Frank on guitar, Miguel Enciso on Bass, Mac Eastham on tuba, "Wash" on Washboard. Joel moved to piano. Jim Borland, BSR's Billy Strayhorn (obs. –Ed.), ran sound. Solo Kudos: Rhonda sang an impromptu

verse of *Buddy Bolden Blues*. A good version, she did it a la Dr. John. *I Want to Be Happy* got the dancers up, we did a fun version. We had a good dueling banjo solo here, Dee & Gary. The crowd seemed to dig this happy tune, we should try it again: File it under *Who knew?*.

Del led the final set & doubled on clarinet (sounds like the line to a song). We started w/ our theme song (set for Public Domain on 1/1/20), then played your traditional Rhonda & Sandy standards. The crowd knows what to do on *Goody, Goody...* as part of the act & setting the stage for a moving rendition of *Down By the Riverside*. The crowd really sang great here. Good show! **Set 3 Tunes**: (1) *Basin St. Blues* (1928) (2) *Baby Face* (1926); (3) *Bye Bye Blues* (1926), with Rhonda on vocals); (4) *Goody Goody* (1936) had Sandy & the Crowd on vocals; (5) *Down by the Riverside* (1918), had all singing.

Set 3 Musicians: George on piano, Jeff on Trombone, Del on Clarinet, I played tenor sax, Ed on bari sax, Dee & Gary on banjo, Mac on tuba, Miguel on Bass, Joel on violin, Fernie on drums, Wash on board; Jim ran sound. **Solo Kudos:** A really great set. Kudos to all, especially the banjos & violin. Del had some nice clarinet solos as well. Those who straggled in early enjoyed it and danced: Always a goal...to swing it. Our set list liner notes are provided in this issue.

BSR July Jam: D's Liner Notes

As emcee for the jam, I have some filler info about a tune for dead time between tunes. My ulterior motive is to set the tone for a tune by sharing its origins & more famous arrangements. My teacher at Cuesta College, Cassie Tarantino taught me to "learn the culture behind a tune, then you can better understand how to play it." Use the July Jambalaya to match personnel w/ sets (S = Set #):

S1.1: Dr. Jazz (1926; Joe "King" Oliver) was a popular tune first made famous by Jelly Roll Morton & his Red Hot Peppers (not King Oliver, go figure). It had a recent resurgence w/ Harry Connick Jr. One would think Dr. John does a good version as well. For some reason I consider it a George Smith tune.

S1.2: Muskrat Rumble (1926; Kid Ory) was made popular by Louis Armstrong & His Hot Five, their signature tune. The tune was also central in the 30s & 40s Dixieland revival as made famous

by Lu Watters' Yerba Buena Jazz Band.

S1.3: (Back Home Again in) Indiana (1917; C: James F. Hadley, L: Ballard MacDonald) was introduced as a Tin Pan Alley pop song & became a theme song for the state, and opens the Indy 500 (as sung by Jim Nabors). Although not officially the Indiana state song, it has been made famous by a wide range of artists from the Original Dixieland Jazz Band to The Jackson 5.

S.1.4: Route 66 (1946; Bobby Troup) was a post-WWII tune about westward expansion & exploration: Many cities never mentioned in previous tunes here (e.g., San Bernadino). The tune was an immediate hit for Nat King Cole (its most famous version). That same year Bing Crosby & The Andrews Sisters also had a hit. During a family road trip, Bobby Troup originally wrote the tune about Route 40, but his wife Cynthia suggested "Get Your Kicks on Route 66."

S1.5: Do You Know What It Means to Be Miss New Orleans? (1947; Eddie DeLange & Louis Alter) was originally performed by Louis Armstrong & performed by Billie Holiday in the movie New Orleans. One would have thought it were an older tune. The tune has become an anthem for New Orleans & most prominently covered by the original artists, Fats Domino, & Harry Connick Jr. (w/ Dr. John).

S1.6: Bye Bye Blackbird (1926; C: Ray Henderson, L: Mort Dixon) was listed as the #16 song of 1926 by Pop Culture Madness. It later gained cultural significance as a theme for the 1963 Selma marches. Dean Martin, Peggy Lee, & Joe Cocker all had hits with the tune. It was a favorite of the Beatles, recorded by both Ringo Starr (1970) and Paul McCartney (2012).

S2.1: Hello, Dolly! (1964; Jerry Herman) was written for the musical of the same name. Louis Armstrong appeared opposite Barbra Streisand in the film. The song won the 1965 Grammy for Best Song & Louis Armstrong won Best Vocal Performance, amazingly at 64 years old. His version was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame in 2001.

S2.2: I Want to Be Happy (1925; C: Vincent Youmans; L: Irving Caesar). Written for the Musical "No, No, Nanette" (the purported reason why Babe Ruth was sold from the Red Sox to the Yankees), it became an instant hit. The tune was in the top 20 six

times, the last by Benny Goodman in 1937. I best remember the Bing Crosby version.

S2.3: Mairzey Dotes (1943; Milton Drake, Al Hoffman, and Jerry Livingston) is a comic novelty tune that reached #1 in March, 1944, with the Merry Macs. My mother used to sing this tune to me as a kid: "A kid'll eat ivy too, wouldn't you?" It is based on an old English tune that the lead composer's 4-year-old daughter came home singing "Cows eat wheat and sows eat wheat and little sharks eat oysters."

S2.4: Buddy Bolden Blues (1938; Jelly Roll Morton) was a tune dedicated to, or taken from, Buddy

Bolden. It is said that Bolden's version came about in 1902 in NOLA's Back o' Town district, when the stench caused Buddy to cry "let the foul air out." His trombonist Paul Cornish broke out in this song. Bolden was committed to an insane asylum in 1907 at the age of 30. He died in 1931

S2.5: Rosetta (1936; C: Earl "Fatha" Hines, L: Henri Woode) is a well-known jazz standard that stands the test of time. The tune was made famous by Bob Wills in 1938, so much that he named his daughter Rosetta in 1940. I prefer the Fatha original. Perhaps a perfect tune.

S3.1: Basin Street Blues (1928; Spencer Williams) was an immediate hit for Louis Armstrong. It has been covered successfully by acts ranging from Bob Wills and His Playboys to Glenn Miller and Jack

Teagarden to Ray Charles. The BSR Theme Song, we try to feature it.


S3.2: Baby Face (1926, C: Harry Akst; L: Benny Davis). Made famous by the 1933 movie of the same name starring a baby-faced Barbara Stanwick. Most famous version, Little Richard (1958): His highest charted tune in the UK (#2).

S3.3: Goody Goody (1936; C: Matty Malneck; L: Johnny Mercer). First featured in the play You Can't Take it With You, it reached it's billboard peak at #20 in 1958 w/ Frankie Lymon and The Teenagers (as featured on the Ed Sullivan Show). Later it had a resurgence on Tony Bennett's 2014 Cheek to

Cheek Album (w/ Lady Gaga, who claimed to be a "Baddie.")

S3.4: Down By the Riverside (AKA "Ain't Gonna Study War No More") (1918) is a spiritual with roots tracing back to before the civil war. It was first published in Plantation Melodies: A Collection of Modern, Popular & Old-time Negro-Songs of the Southland. It has since been covered over 100 times and used as an anti-Vietnam war theme. Allan Sherman parodied the tune in 1963's Don't Buy the Liverwurst.

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First Gig for 16-piece Big Band!

On August 12, a group of Basin Street Regulars attended the inaugural performance of the 16piece Friendly Neighborhood Big Band at the Grace Bible Church in Arroyo Grande.

Many players were familiar to those that patronize our local big bands, but there were some new faces as well.

The band played 14 pieces plus an encore. Selections included Take Me Out to the Ball Game. Shiny Stockings, Superman Theme, Learnin the Blues, Satin Doll and Groovin' Hard. The vocalists were Mitch Latting, local favorite Tim McGill, and the ever-luminous Kathryn Loomis.

The band is produced by trumpeter Danny Beher, and directed by Mitch Latting, known to the Basin Street Regulars as the Director of the Starlight Dreamband and the San Luis Jazz Band.

The bands' performance was outstanding, considering that this was their premier concert.

Mitch said the new band provides an opportunity for some local musicians to sight read medium-todifficult, big band charts. Their rehearsals are based on sight reading 10-15 different arrangements weekly at their Monday night rehearsals.

Their co-founder, Danny Beher, provides 100's of big band arrangements for them. Danny and Adele Beher owned Walrus Music Publication and Otter Distribution, now sold to Ejazzlines. Walrus's mission was to provide a home for independent, and overlooked, music arrangers.

FNBB will provide a free show, approximately every three months, for their rehearsal space host. Donations at the shows are gladly accepted. All donations will be given to their host, in return for rehearsal space each week.

I'm sure that this band will grow in popularity as it continues to perform and develop an outreach program. We are fortunate to live in an area that supports live music on so many platforms.


House Concert Park-Like, Comfy


