Dave Stuckey has been swinging his way through Los Angeles for more than a decade now, but his musical adventures as guitar player and drummer go back farther than that, through Western Swing, Rockabilly and prebop Jazz with Dave Stuckey & The 4 Hoot Owls, The Dave & Deke Combo and The Bonebrake Syncopators.

These days the main dish on the menu is The Hot House Gang, a hard-charging outfit that channels an Eddie Condon small-group drive with vocal jive that might conjure thoughts of Wingy Manone or Fats Waller. One thing's for sure -- with a crack, All-Star outfit (Marc Caparone, Nate Ketner, Josh Collazo and Carl Sonny Leyland) swinging the beat, a regimen of vigorous rug-cutting is always prescribed.

Dave Stuckey and the Hot House Gang are headed to the Gazebo for a whole different kind of clambake!

responds to Facebook posts during the event. She also takes in membership.

**Linda Shorb** also pre-publicizes the event and mans the Facebook and YouTube comments during the event as our official "Pismo Jazz" representative.

Jeff Cardinal oversees the set up and operation of the sound equipment and runs the sound board along with Jim Borland. He trouble-shoots during the event, insuring the quality of the sound. He also runs camera when able.

Jim Borland mans the sound board along with Jeff Cardinal, trouble-shoots as needed and helps put away all of the sound equipment, including neatly coiling the wires, at the end of the concert. Jim is also one of our band finders and bookers.

Fernie Monreal monitors the concert Livestream from inside the house to ensure that what our on-line audience is seeing and hearing is as good as what we are hearing in the back yard.

**Hugh Robinson** mans the money table, accepting donations and membership dues, selling masks and pins and promotes all of the benefits of joining our club.

Tara Hoffman and Ruben Flores operate our donation-driven bar, dispensing wine and beer and cheer to all who come to visit. They are always happy to see everyone and are Goodwill Ambassadors for our club.

**Curtis Reinhart** fills in as needed and is also one of our band scouts. He helps find and book the bands and also helps clean up the yard at the end of the concert.

Simon Mercado, representing Noble Productions, while not a volunteer, is integral to the success of our Livestream broadcasts. He sets up the links and the countdown screens in advance, sets up the streaming equipment prior to the show, tests the Livestream before our start time and monitors and solves problems during the broadcast. If we are doing a 3-camera show, he operates as the switcher during the concert. If it is a one-camera show, he will often operate the camera. He is the meat and potatoes of how we have been able to

keep this going month after month.

So that is how many people it takes to make this all happen. We are a village! We just want everyone to know that these events are a team effort and that we are grateful for the amount of help and support we get month after month.

We have contacted a few more people and bands since last month- Mariachi Autlence, Washboard Steve and Paul Ingle. We may get a few more as we get closer, we are holding off on the big bands and the school bands for now.

We had a meeting with the Parks and Recreation Program Director at the Grover Beach Community Center and had a good discussion and review of the facility. It has excellent amenities but presents a few challenges. The parking lot is limited, although there is plenty of street parking in the surrounding neighborhood. We are already in negotiation with a little market next door to make use of their parking lot during the event. They are very willing to work with us. We are also not able to set up the building until noon on Friday because there is a preschool in there from 9:00 to 12:00 every weekday. This will require some serious preplanning and coordination in order to get that Continued from page 2

venue up and running as quickly as possible on Friday and we will lose a few sets due to this delay. But we will work through it and make it happen.

The Ramona Park facility is small, but nice and there is a lot of city parking directly across the street. We want to make use of the auxiliary lots so that our guests have plenty of good places to park before they get on the bus and start their day.

As of this writing, the State of California has opened the door for large indoor events. Attendees will have to show their vaccination cards and capacity will be limited, but it is a great start. We hope that by the end of October we can be at full capacity and that vaccination cards will not be necessary. But at least we can see the light.

It is hard to restart a festival that has been somewhat dormant for a year. Buses, sound systems, pianos, concessionaires- none of our regular external contractors were used in 2020. We did gain a lot of valuable experience with Livestreaming though, and we will take that with us into 2021. Our theme this year is the Phoenix rising from the ashes. We are looking forward to this year's cover painting by Priscilla Wilson and we think it will express how all of us feel- a new day after a long winter. In spite of the obstacles, we continue to move forward.

#### March Was Challenging

It has been quite a while since we had a big band in our back yard, and this band was even bigger than Riptide. We had a full 17 pieces on and in front of the gazebo. Fred Felch came over on Saturday to help set up the yard and the sound and Jeff and Jim were back at it Sunday morning doing the final preps. The band arrived around 12:30 for a 1:15 start of test time and they were here and ready to play at 1:15.

We had decided to do a three camera show due to the size of the band. Shonda manned the right camera, Jeff or I did the middle camera and the left camera was static. Simon was the switcher. Jeff and Jim ran the sound board and Fernie was the man in the house watching the broadcast.

We started our Livestream test at around 1:20 and the band played until 1:40 while various people went in and out of the house to see how it was looking and sounding on the broadcast. By the end of the test, we were all in agreement that the sound and the video were good.

But when the show started, the sound was out of balance and we had to readjust again. What happened? We are still working on the answer to that question, but we were able to fix it before too long. Oh well, another show that didn't go exactly right. But we did it and that's what's most important. Next month there will be a different challenge. That is the beauty of Live- Streaming. It's live.

#### But, is it Jazz?

A while back, I was on a gig and having a conversation with a friend who was involved with the event wherein I mentioned that while most folks think of me as only playing a certain type of music I also love jazz and really enjoy any opportunity I get to play it. I said, "I like everything from Trad to Big Band/Swing and even contemporary, but I mostly enjoy Bebop." My friend said she didn't allow Bebop at this event and asked if I could play regular jazz something like Take 5. I laughed a bit and teasingly said that Take 5 was kind of Bebop. Later on, I was asked if I would write an article explaining why I think Take 5 was Bebop and not "regular" jazz. So, is Dave Brubeck's Take 5 Bebop? \*Spoiler Alert! The short answer is no. In fact, it would be more accurate to call that song Cool Jazz. So, the real question isn't "Is Take 5 Bebop?" the correct question here is, "What's the difference between Bebop and Cool Jazz?" Let us see if we can make some sense of this.

Bebop started around the mid to late 1940s more or less as a way for musicians to experiment and stretch out their musical chops. With less emphasis on dancing and simple melodies, musicians like Charlie Parker, Thelonious Monk, Dizzy Gillespie and even Charlie Christian could use faster tempos, more complex chords and harmonies, and put more emphasis on improvisation. The style was really more for the musicians than the dancers or casual listeners. Around the early 1950s, a new variety of jazz referred to as Cool Jazz started popping up. Cool Jazz was slower and more mellow and was essentially an answer to Bebop. While it seemed to put an emphasis back on melody with easy tempos and relaxing grooves, it kept Bebop's interest in complex harmonies and chords and often showcased long improvisational sections just like Bebop. This style is often associated with the laid-back hipster lounge scene of the 1950s; think Stan Getz or Chet Baker. While Dave Brubeck is one of the biggest names in the Cool Jazz genre, many musicians crossed back and forth between Cool and Bebop. While being one of the early fathers of Bebop,

Mile Davis is probably best known today for his "Cool" recordings.

Is *Take 5* by Dave Brubeck Bebop? No, it's Cool Jazz. So why did I call it Bebop then? Let's look at a couple things. First off *Take 5* is in 5/4 time, a bit odd for "regular jazz". Second, it's in Eb minor with a melody and chords that heavily suggest the Eb Dorian mode (heaven forbid there be modes in "regular jazz") instead of just Eb minor. It's also 5 minutes and 28 seconds long; the majority of which consists of a roughly 3-minute drum solo! Modes? Odd times? A 3-minute drum solo? Kind 'a smells like Bebop, huh?

Maybe the moral here is that we should not judge music by labels or by pre-conceived ideas. Maybe all jazz is just "Jazz," and we should listen to it on a case-by-case situation and decide later if we like it and what we should call it. Or maybe I'm just too much of a sarcastic smart aleck to answer such questions. Ha ha!
