Katye, Vocals - Katye has been singing as long as she can remember. She was raised in a musical family and although she has no formal training, she absorbed all of the music that surrounded her, from jazz to Motown. She moved from Los Angeles to Santa Maria in 1979. In the 1980's she joined a rock band called Split Second. Then her love of jazz led her to joining a lovely, local big band called The Starlighters, where she made contact with Ed Hite and later she joined Ed's quartet and has been performing with him ever since. Her desire is to continue to perform and introduce as many people as possible to this wonderful genre of music known as jazz!

Tom Bennett, Drums - Tom is a Santa Maria native and comes from a long-line of musicians. Tom received a snare drum on his 10th birthday and it's been love ever since. His grandfather played in many bands and taught him early to play the drums, "don't just pound". Tom has played in many different groups over the past several decades. He has loved playing with Ed, Katye and Vito for years. **Vito Biondo, Bass -** Vito comes from a family of generational tradition of musicians, predominantly bassists and drummers, and

has always considered the two as one unit. From an early age of studying guitar, in his high school years became more interested in the bass. Vito says that providing a foundation for the other instruments is most important and satisfying, stating that playing a groove suspends time and promotes imagination for improvisation, providing space for them to 'do their thing', while killing ego, and committing fully to the music and the moment. Vito prefers to look at the audience as participants as opposed to merely observers or spectators, taking them on a ride along!

Ed Hite, Guitar - Ed was born and raised on California's Central Coast. He has been a fixture on the area's jazz scene for over forty years. A bop and swing based guitarist, his influences have been Kenny Burrell, Joe Pass and others. Ed has played and performed as a soloist, in a guitar/vocal duo and with numerous quartets and big bands. Known for his love of harmony, and his ability to swing, Ed continues to use his passion for the guitar and jazz as a vehicle to bring a sense of joy to those who come to listen.

EQ is all about making music fun and engaging for the listener. Your feet will be tapping and head nodding to the music that made jazz legends of amazing musicians such as Ella Fitzgerald, Duke Ellington, Dianna Krall, and many others, old and new. Relax and enjoy!

Sonny Leyland All-Star Quartet:



Carl Sonny Leyland was born and raised on the South Coast of England. He now resides in sunny California. He became drawn to American music, as he listened to the LP records his father would play. At age 15 Sonny discovered boogie woogie

and he began to make his own music on the piano and guitar. Captivated by the sound of Continued on page 2

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the repeating eight to the bar left hand pattern, Sonny was inspired to go on a path that would become his life's purpose. Within three months he would be performing in public, and shortly after would become a member of a respected local group "The Bob Pearce Blues Band." In 1988 Sonny had the opportunity to come to the USA. He relocated to New Orleans where he would spend the next nine years. Over the years Sonny has developed an appreciation for traditional jazz, blues, western swing, rockabilly, and country music. His playing displays an infectious spontaneity, providing plenty of surprises for the listener. He was inducted into the Boogie Woogie Hall of Fame in 2011. You can also listen to Sonny on KCBX Radio on Friday nights 7:30 to 8:30 PM when he hosts the show "Rhythm Retrospective".



Dave Stuckey has been swinging his way through Los Angeles for more than a decade now, but his musical adventures as guitar player and drummer go back farther than that, through Western Swing, Rockabilly

and pre-bop Jazz with Dave Stuckey & The 4 Hoot Owls, The Dave & Deke Combo and The Bonebrake Syncopators.

Katie Cavera has made a name for herself on the West Coast and in Europe playing 20's and 30's classic jazz. She is a rhythm guitar specialist in the style of Freddie Green and Al Casey. She also plays hot 20's plectrum and tenor banjo, New Orleans style



string bass, and sings in the 20's pop style of Helen Kane and Ruth Etting.

Katie Cavera is originally from Southern Indiana and attended Indiana University studying jazz performance and composition with Dr. David Baker, playing with his Jazz Ensemble in a special presentation of Duke Ellington Masterworks at the Smithsonian Institution.

Since moving to Southern California, Katie has become a sought-after guitarist, banjoist,

and bassist. She currently works at Disney California Adventure as a bassist and vocalist with The Pixarmonic Orchestra which premiered this past summer at Disneyland's Pixarfest. The band plays music from Pixar films in the style of Spike Jones.

Marc Caparone is an outstanding trumpet player, and well known at many jazz festivals. He started attending Jazz Jubilee by the Sea in the 1970's with his father,



Dave, a trombone player and one of the founders of the Basin Street Regulars. By age 13 Marc was playing cornet in a youth band, and by age 15 was holding down the second cornet chair in the "Rent Party Stompers" in San Luis Obispo. By age 17, noted jazz journalist Phil Elwood noted in the San Francisco Chronicle that "Caparone plays the trumpet with knowing style and grace."

While performing with the Boilermaker Jazz Band at the 2000 Dixieland Monterey, Marc met his future wife, jazz vocalist Dawn Lambeth. They have been married fifteen years and now have a son and a daughter.

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We Remember Chet Jaeger

Nov. 7 1924 - Jan. 4, 2022

The venerable Night Blooming Jazzmen band was a fixture at festivals throughout California since the inception of trad jazz festivals in the mid-70's. NBJ was invited to almost every Jubilee by the Sea as well



as appearing most years at one of our regular Sunday sessions. At our last in-person festival in 2019, its leader, Chet Jaeger, was well into his 90s.

In 2019, the Country commemorated the



75th anniversary of D-Day. We decided to honor our WW II Veterans and other senior citizens by making our theme "A Salute to the 90s". In this case, 90s referred to all attendees and musicians that were 90 years old or older. In a conversation with Chet laeger, he told me that

those who were in their 90's were "nonagenarians". This inspired us to make special buttons that said "I'm a nonagenarian. Ask me about my life". Chet, of course, was

one of the most celebrated nonagenarians at the event, along with the irrepressible Pat Yankee. We decided to incorporate the D-Day theme into our program cover and obtained pictures of both Chet Jaeger and Pat Yankee from the



WW II era. Chet sent us a photo of himself in uniform. He was in the Army Air Corps as a weatherman.

The photos were given to our graphic artist, Priscilla Wilson, and she created a wonderful tribute painting of the two in their younger years. At the conclusion of the festival, the original painting and an identical

copy were presented to each of the artists during the closing ceremony. Both recipients were deeply touched; it made for a memorable occasion for everybody.

The Night **Blooming** Jazzmen graced our stages on many occasions, and a video record of that lives on. Chet had a very droll, very dry sense of humor, which is evident in his introductions to his songs throughout and performances. He never missed an opportunity to perform, especially in Pismo

Beach. Franklin Clay made several recordings during Jubilee and Jeff Cardinal recorded the band in 2014. In December, we Livestreamed from the Vet's Hall for the very first time. This

presented a new set of challenges for the team. The internet speed at the Vet's Hall is not sufficient Livestream a show with the quality that our viewers have become



accustomed to. We still have many people out there that are not ready to attend an in -person show and are counting on watching from home, although our hall was pretty full that day.

To solve the internet problem, Simon brought a hotspot. He also brought a new video camera that is able to accept a stereo from the sound board. signal

On the Thursday before the show, Jeff, myself, Jim Borland, Curtis Reinhardt and Simon went to the Vet's Hall to check over and test our equipment and conduct a All of the sound Livestream test. equipment worked well, and Simon was able to get a good outgoing stream. He test - streamed to Valerie, who gave it the thumbs up.

On Sunday, Simon started setting up at 10:00 and did a test stream of the jammers. I set up my laptop with external speakers in the classroom, so that we could monitor the

The show started on schedule and we Livestreamed the entire day, including the



break. We did not stop the stream during intermission and we did not have an intermission band that day. Due to the great festivities in the hall, we did not monitor the output as closely as we have when we are at the house. When we reviewed the video later, we found that the sound is overdriven throughout the show, leading to some

distortion and that the bass is loud and distorted for much of the time. In the future we will keep a closer eye on that and try to correct earlier.

Overall, it was a successful day and good proof of concept; and we look forward to doing many, many, more quality shows in the Vet's Hall.
