The Barrelhouse Wailers serve up their own take on Prohibition Era hot jazz and blues music of the 1920's and 1930's. They perform on only acoustic instruments to retain the authentic sound of that period. The Wailers bring their passion and energy to the style, making it as fresh today as it was when it was the newest, hottest dance music 100 years ago! This eclectic crew really entertains with a whole lot of jazz, a pinch of blues, and a bayou full of New Orleans swagger. They have been influenced by a cocktail of artists, past and present, like Bessie Smith, Ella Fitzgerald, Preservation Hall Jazz Band, Tuba Skinny, Sydney Bechet, Billie Holiday as well as Traditional New Orleans Jazz, Classic Blues, Country Blues and Big Band sounds. Their 2019 CD release, "Day In, Day Out", features 7 original compositions and a 1919 cover in the public domain and is available for digital download on Bandcamp.com. The band began performing shows in January, 2013, and has been playing steadily around Ventura and Los Angeles since then.

President's Message by Rhonda Cardinal

With the pandemic somewhat behind us (though never far away), I would like to reflect on some of the good things that happened as a result of us trying to keep our social lives going while sequestered in our houses. Two new software platforms emerged, Livestream and Zoom.

On-line meeting software was coming into its own before I retired in late 2014. When I worked in Southern California, I spent many hours a week driving to various meetings across the So Cal basin, in traffic, in heat, sometimes without air conditioning. When I accepted the job at Vandenberg, it was many months before I actually moved. Often, when I was parked on the freeway, I couldn't believe that I was actually going to escape this mess.

When I started at Vandenberg, almost overnight, virtual meetings appeared. Someone

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would share their screen and pop in a slide show; everyone else would be listening in on their phones. Amazing. Where had this technology been hiding? Vandenberg was a remote site, so traveling all the time for low level meetings was not an option.

So that was the state of technology until Zoom. In Zoom meetings, you could actually see everyone's faces and talk to them - although not all at once. And you could still share your screen, so that we could still all look at the same slide show. But beyond that, you could have family holiday celebrations, family drinking parties, BSR Board meetings, interviews with your favorite band members, memorial events, recording of your musical part in an ensemble- and all could be recorded for posterity. I did all of these things during Covid. When it was possible to start meeting in person again, we did it once- then went back to Zoom. It is just a lot easier for people that live all across the Central Coast to just go to their living room and click on the link.

The other great software innovation has been variations of Livestream. Livestream was around pre-Covid, but was not widely used. Many people would "Go Live" on Facebook and share a song at a concert or a special moment at a celebration. This was typically done with a cell phone; picture and audio often of dubious quality. Another group that utilized early Livestreaming was the on-line gaming community. This group used streaming software to broadcast their computer monitors while competing with other players on-line. This application was relatively unknown to many of us.

When Covid restrictions started, Livestreaming was a medium that musicians discovered rapidly, once they could no longer perform to a public audience. When linked to online payment software, fans had the opportunity to watch a show and pay the artist while the artist was performing. It also allowed people to watch artists that they would not otherwise travel to see, potentially expanding their fan base.

From the first time that Dean suggested it to us in March of 2020 until this month, October 2022, we have been learning and refining our Livestream techniques. We do not Livestream from phones or tablets. We are using digital cameras linked to our laptops and we are plugging into our audio from the mixing board. If all goes well, and the internet is good, we are sending out high quality audio and video to our

audience, who can watch it live. These broadcasts are also recorded and available on-line for those that want to watch it later. We use a "capture card" to take the images from the camera and transfer it to our laptop and OBS studio software to take all of this data and transfer it to the Facebook and YouTube platforms.

We have become this sophisticated because of a call I made early on to get help from Valerie Mercado, who turned me onto her brother Simon. Simon was a gamer who liked to dabble in technology, photography and videography. He instructed us to buy a capture card, and then we started hiring him to put all of the pieces together and make all of the software platforms work. Without help from Simon, we would never collectively have been able to achieve the level of production that we eventually accomplished.

There will always be a niche for Livestream. I recently was able to watch a High Holiday service with my dad in his room that was being broadcast from his former Temple in La Habra. There is no way I can take my dad to these services now, so to be able to watch them live and have him see people he knows participating is a real blessing. But when it comes to music, there is less and less of a demand as people return live to the venues that they love and missed.

We have decided to stop Livestreaming after October, although we will Livestream part of our January Jubilee. Simon has decided to get a "day job" and move onto other things as the Livestream market is drying up. Simon is looking for a job that makes use of his many technical and creative skills. We are very grateful to him for helping us get through the pandemic without missing a show. I am hoping that by the time this newsletter if published, he will have already found the job of his dreams. Thank you all for helping someone that helped us when we needed it most.

Harvest Festival Parade

The Basin Street Regulars was major sponsor of, and had an entry in the Arroyo Grande Harvest Festival parade this year. Our entry was a 16-foor flat-bed trailer loaded with musicians from the BSR Jammers. The use of

the trailer was donated by Danny and Sam George of Orcutt, and they towed the trailer. Jeff Cardinal spent the better part of two days putting sound equipment, drums, chairs, music stands and a keyboard on the trailer in such a way that it could travel down the freeway without losing any pieces.

On the day of the parade, Danny towed the trailer, with the Cardinals following close behind. Jeff had covered the keyboard with its padded cloth cover, but it was not fully secured. It blew off the keyboard and onto the freeway almost immediately. Jeff stopped his vehicle and retrieved the cover in traffic. There were no further incidents.

We gathered at the staging location on Branch Street. On the trailer were Sandy Smallwood and Katherine Loomis on vocals. Rhonda Cardinal on alto Sax, Jeff Cardinal on trumpet, Paul Buscaino on trombone, Jon Mounts on keyboard, David Venturini on bass, and Fernie Monreal on drums. We also had walkers to pass out beads and postcards, including Shonda Croly, Amelia Chastain, Malcolm Chastain, (resplendent in his king outfit) Debi Duetsch, Juliann Hemphill and Tara Hoffman. In addition, we had our own sponsors banner, carried by Alice Addison and Fred Felch. Quite an assemblage!

We were the last entry in the parade as we were supposed to debark in the Village and play another set at the Jaffa Café. We spent a lot of time while parked practicing our songs, but when we finally got on the official parade route we barely had time to get through three of them! The three songs were Basin Street Blues with Jeff on trumpet, Exactly Like You with Sandy on vocals and I Want to Be Happy with Kathryn on vocals. We stopped in front of Jaffa Café, where Curtis exhorted us to unload, but we were right in the middle of a song, so it had to wait.

We finally got all of our needed stuff off the trailer for our streetside performance. Jim Borland and Curtis Reinhardt were the advance team, with a smaller PA system set up and waiting for us. While we got ourselves situated, a quartet from the Central Coast Chordsmen entertained the small audience. After about 30 minutes, we started playing our land set, while Danny moved the trailer and parked it. We played for about 45 minutes to an appreciative audience and then

everyone was treated to a delicious Mediterranean lunch. Fred helped shuttle people back to their cars and then it was time for everyone to go home. All this by 2:00 p.m. What a (fun) day!

In the Wings

We have a great show coming up for you in November when **Brass Nickels** will be our featured band. Sacramento has been the home for traditional jazz on the west coast since the 1970's. The Sacramento Jazz Jubilee was the largest traditional jazz festival in the world for the last quarter of the 20th century, celebrating the west coast jazz styles championed by musicians like Lu Watters and Turk Murphy. It has been the model for dozens of festivals up and down the western states to this day.

The Brass Nickels Jazz Band (formerly known as the Pub Crawlers) is made up of Sacramento-area musicians steeped in this history. Its musicians have played together in various bands featured at these festivals, including, among others, Sister Swing, The Fulton Street Jazz Band, Stan Mark and His River City Stomperz, and The Wooden Nickel Jass Band, the latter being one of the most popular traditional bands of the 1990s.

This band features Dave Johnson on trumpet and vocals. Otis Mourning on reeds, Bob Williams on trombone and vocals, Bonnie Otto on piano, Alan Parks on bass and tuba and Rick Canfield on drums.

Our opening band will be VOCE. Voce is the premier vocal jazz ensemble at Cuesta College. Since its inception in 1981, the ensemble has toured extensively on the West Coast and has toured Europe eleven times. Voce has received numerous awards including an Outstanding Performance Award from Downbeat Magazine, First Place at the Reno Jazz Festival, two invitations to perform at the Conference of the International Association of Jazz Educators, three invitations to perform at the Jazz Education Network conference, and an appearance at the National Convention of the American Choral Directors Association.

More bands have been hired since last month. St. Gabriel's Celestial Brass Band is in work along with Dawn Lambeth and Friends and Big Sirs of Swing.

Our online ticketing service, My805Tix is up and running and we are selling badges on it as we speak (or write). Thanks to Linda Shorb and Linda Dutart for their ongoing efforts in support of this new platform. (https://www.my805tix.com/e/jubilee2023)

One big focus has been to wrestle better deals from our hotels. Curtis and I made a presentation to the Pismo Beach Hospitality Association in August. The Conference and Visitors Bureau released a Request for Proposal to all of the hotels asking them to provide rooms to us at a reduced rate. This is finally stating to pay off, and we have had positive responses from the Seacrest, Tides, Inn at the Cove, Beach House, Vespera and Pismo View Inn. We are working on two hotels in Arroyo Grande, the Agrarian and the Oxford Suites. We are in the process of confirming the details and checking the links before we put all of the information on our website. LaDean Talcott has volunteered to collect and publicize this information. Thanks for that, LaDean.

Speaking of the website, that has recently been updated, thanks to the efforts of Curtis Reinhardt and Juliann Hemphill. Please go on-line and check it out and let us know if you have any problems.

The bus contract is in work. We will be going with SLOSafe Ride again, and Pacific Christian Church in Orcutt, after their great reviews in 2019. The buses will be staged at each of the venues and will rotate around the circuit during the breaks between sets. They will not continuously rove. We tried this in 2018 and 2019 and it worked very well. Jim Bull is spearheading this effort and will also be a volunteer driver from Pacific

Christian. As before, you will be able to arrange for a hotel pick up in the morning, by calling the listed number in advance. You can be dropped back off at your hotel throughout the day or at the end of the day. We will not do mid-day pickups at hotels; you will have to call a cab or an Uber to get back to a festival venue. Once there, you can get on the bus to the other venues.

As you can see, plans are shaping up for what we hope will be a banner festival. 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
