#### **Prez Says**

Our experimental Jazz Jubilee Central Coast has concluded. Curtis Reinhardt conceived of this new festival style, and I agreed that it was model worth exploring.


Jeff and I attended many shows, most were coordinated and hosted by other venues or clubs. BSR was only directly responsible for the Puffers show, the School Band show at the Grover Beach Community Center and the Sunday Vet's Hall show. We coordinated many other performances, including Elias and Madeline at Stellar's Cellar in Orcutt, Jeff Elliott at Costa De Oro, West Coast Gumbo at Harry's with special guest Dave Ruffner, and the Central Coast Guitar Fest at the Mark Bar and Grill. We advertised other shows that were occurring during our festival time frame but were not otherwise associated with BSR, including the Starlight Dreamband at the Madonna Inn, Gaile Gillespie and Her Big Band at Trilogy, several SLO lazz Federation shows, Puffers (other than the Ruffner show) and several Cuesta College shows.



We sponsored the Clark Center presentation of the Pacific Mambo Orchestra. We started out by agreeing to sponsor Pancho Sanchez, but that artist canceled his appearance there. The center's booking manager was able to pivot and hire Pacific Mambo Orchestra on very short notice. BSR

received many perks for this sponsorship, including discounted rates for all members, advertising in the Clark Center brochures and invitations to special receptions before and at the show intermission.

Most of the shows that I attended boasted above-average crowds. The show at Stellar's Cellar was packed on a Wednesday night. I saw BSR people watching the Mariachi Band at the Maya Restaurant who were there because we advertised it. I saw BSR people attending the



The Puffer's show featuring Dave Ruffner, Dawn Lambeth, Sam Rocha and Jim Stromberg was a rare treat for everyone there. Dave Ruffner was brought in for five days and appeared as a guest artist during five different shows. He raised the bar on every one of them.

The show at the Clark Center was a wonderful, and the receptions were intimate and well-provisioned.

We only had to bring equipment to the school band show at the Grover Beach Community Center and our usual setup at the Vet's Hall on Sunday. A far cry from setting up five different venues in preparation for a full-fledged festival. Everything was just easier for us, the organizers. We did get sponsorships from some of the venues that staged shows for us, a little bit of payback for our advertising. Or, they hired the bands and we didn't have to pay for them.

Juliann and the New Times both produced programs for us. The New Times center section looked great and was produced under Curtis Reinhardt's direction. The online turning page program by Juliann was more detailed, with Juliann making a map for us and Shonda and I contributing the content. Jim Borland kept the website updated throughout the numerous revisions to the schedule and content. Shonda Croly assisted with publicity and ticketing, Linda Dutart was on top of the financials and contracts. Linda Shorb and Shonda Croly both helped with publicity and sponsorships.

Personally, I was pretty happy with this method of staging a festival. We did not have to work very hard physically, did not have to

coordinate airline flights and arrivals, or deal with last-minute schedule changes due to delayed or canceled flights, comply with different contract requirements for multiple city venues, did not have to rent blocks of hotel rooms or talk about buses and bus routes. These things plus many, many other details that comprise an entire festival. It was still a lot of work, much of it under short notice with tight deadlines. Your Board came through, supporting this event in their various areas of expertise. We also got a lot of support from Valerie Mercado at Noble Productions. There is no question that earlier planning might have made it easier, so we will need to decide in the next two months what to do for 2025.

I know that this festival was not as good as a traditional event in certain ways; we heard about it from the comments and e-mails we received. The Board was also split on this and not completely sold, but graciously agreed to move forward in spite of their reservations.

The financials of this arrangement look very good. At most, we will lose \$4000 on this experiment. In comparison, our January 2023 event put us \$73,000 in the hole. To be fair, January 2023 was not a good month, weatherwise; we had the deluge of the century the week before our festival. But I think it is also true that attendance at all festivals is way down since COVID, and a much lower audience must be planned for no matter how you stage an event.

I do know how to stage the standard five-venue event (or four or three), how to schedule it, budget for it and plan it out. I am willing to share this knowledge. If there is anyone out there who feels strongly enough that they want to make it happen like we did before 2020, I am more than willing to walk someone (or several people) through that process and co-chair an event for 2025. #### Opportunities to Serve

We could use a few volunteers for some critical tasks. The current Board has been handling these details, but it takes time away from other important jobs that they are doing and contributes to the overall overload.

In particular, we are seeking volunteers for this task: Obtaining ABC (liquor) licenses for the Vet's Hall events

Every time we have an event at the Vet's Hall, we need to get a liquor license from the state Alcohol Beverage Control. This involves filling out two forms for the City of PB and submitting each specific show date applications along with a check to the ABC.

We don't use the Vet's Hall every month, so this task is only necessary five to nine times a year.

This job will take about 20 hours of work during 2025. Curtis can train the new volunteer. The process is simple but takes a little time. Chasing signatures and replies is the most time-consuming part of the procedure.
